Syllabus

Teacher: Mr. Davis

Time Frame: 2 periods per 7-day cycle (FOR ONE TERM ONLY – approximately 25 hours)

Course Description:

Theatre Arts is offered at the Junior High level for many reasons. Students will become more confident in speaking in front of others, play-acting builds self-esteem, and the study of Theatre Arts is an artistic endeavour which fosters greater creativity and freedom of expression. Students will explore topical issues and traditional morals and values within their own character study and the drama in which these characters are situated.

Technically speaking, students will become better speakers, better writers, and better critical thinkers when studying Theatre Arts. The study of Theatre Arts however, does require concentration, self discipline and some memorization (this varies based on the characters each student is assigned). Participation in all class activities is required.
